What is marriage?

“A covenant by which a man and a woman establish between themselves a partnership of the whole life and is by its nature ordered towards the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of children.”

– The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) 1601, derived from canon 1055

- A personal, enduring covenant between a consenting man and woman. Not merely a legal contract.
- Established by God for the good and well-being of the spouses.
- Ordered towards procreation and the education of children (Genesis 1:28)



The purpose of sex in marriage

Sex is a God-given gift to be enjoyed exclusively within marriage. Humanae Vitae and the Bible identifies 2 inseparable purposes for sex in marriages



Unitive

To celebrate and deepen the love of a married couple. A unique means of expressing love for each other

“And for this reason a man will leave his father and mother and unite with his wife, and the two will become one, so they are no longer two, but one”

Mark 10:7-8



Procreative

To celebrate God’s procreative plan for the world by making husband and wife co-creators with him in the giving birth to children

“So God created human beings, making them to be like himself. He created them male and female, blessed them, and said, “Have many children, so that your descendants will live all over the earth and bring it under their control”

Genesis 1: 27-28a

Benefits of sexual intimacy



Deep bonding

Physical, emotional, and spiritual closeness that unites couples at every level.



Trust and intimacy

Builds deeper affection, emotional safety, and lasting connection between partners.



Bonding hormone

Touch, kissing, and closeness release oxytocin, strengthening the couple's bond.



Health and wellbeing

Reduces stress, improves sleep quality, and boosts self-esteem over time.



Resisting temptation

Regular intimacy guards against outside temptation (1 Corinthians 7:2–5).



God's design

Intimacy in marriage reflects God's intentional gift for couples to flourish together.

Sexual satisfaction among couples today

Sexual satisfaction refers to a person's overall sense of fulfillment, pleasure and wellbeing in the sexual experience. It is shaped by:

- **Physical pleasures** – enjoyment of touch, arousal etc.
- **Emotional closeness** – feelings of closeness, being safe.
- **Psychological comfort** – feeling respected, free from anxiety.

Communication is one of the biggest drivers in sexual satisfaction. Also, quality and mutual understanding matter much more than frequency alone.



Understanding Orgasm



Orgasm is the peak of sexual pleasure that occurs during sexual stimulation. It is the result of a coordinated response between the brain and nervous system.

Many couples struggle to reach orgasm, which directly affects sexual satisfaction. Causes can be physical, psychological, and relationship factors.

Common barriers to orgasm & sexual satisfaction:

- Stress and mental distraction
- Performance anxiety. Goal-oriented rather than pleasure oriented
- Lack of open communication
- Lack of sufficient arousal or skipped foreplay
- Emotional distance or unresolved conflict
- Health conditions, hormonal changes or medications.

Other causes of sexual dissatisfaction

- One spouse controls the frequency of sex. This can cause suspicion, anger and even low libido.
- History of traumatic sexual abuse or experience.
- Unrealistic expectation from exposure to media & pornography.
- Premature ejaculation.
- Painful intercourse: Tight pelvic muscles can cause painful intercourse.
- Depression as a result of lack of care from either of the couple may result to no sexual desire.
- Cultural or religious influences: Some people's cultural beliefs about sex.
- Withholding sex for selfish reasons, like material demands before sex.
- Substituting sex for Real Love.
- Fear of pregnancy.
- Dirtiness.
- Old age of one of the partners.

How to improve sexual satisfaction

Communicate openly

Talk honestly about desires, likes, dislikes and concerns.

Know yourself

Understanding your body helps you guide your partner effectively.

Understand the language of sex

Tenderness, patience, foreplay, care, self-control. Forgive, reconcile, show love daily (1 Cor 13:4-7)

Prioritise arousal

Don't rush. Foreplay and emotional connection deepens intimacy.

Seek help when needed

Consult a doctor or counsellor for physical or emotional barriers.

Reduce stress

Create a safe mental and emotional space before intimacy begins.

Maintain physical attraction

Accept each other's weaknesses



Love is the foundation

Tenderness, patience, and self-giving create the conditions for true intimacy. Love is the context in which everything else flourishes.
